Each year around the holidays, students and staff celebrate the spirit of the season and take the initiative to share and spread goodwill. Participating in a number of service projects, student activity groups, classrooms, and staff members find new and traditional ways to give back to the community. Projects ranged from collecting and distributing items to making blankets for senior citizens to entertaining throughout the local area.

This year, high school staff developed a National Honor Society service project that provided holiday cheer to the residents of Amber Woods. NHS students created ‘no sew blankets’ and delivered them to residents. All students were able to sign holiday cards, provided by the art department, in their homeroom classes that were sent with each blanket.

Colfax students continued their tradition of performing at the Barnes & Noble in Fox Chapel to kick off the holidays. The school received a percentage of the cost of items purchased that evening. Funds gathered from this event and “special” days throughout the year are donated to various charities selected by the building’s Student Council.

What perhaps has come to be the most anticipated events of the season were the student vocal and instrumental music performances. The Senior Choir and High School Band provided a joint holiday concert in December. They filled the auditorium with wonderful sounds of the season. Students traveled throughout the area, performing at senior care facilities, local malls, and at community organization meetings.
