SHS Holds 90th Graduation

The 90th graduating class of Springdale High School gathered in Marshall Auditorium on May 27th to celebrate the end of their high school years. Friends and family joined the 73 members of the Class of 2022 as they began their last official event as students in the Allegheny Valley School District.

Graduation marked the final milestone of the school for they year. Principal Andrew Leviski hosted the event for the class, highlighting their move through the school system. He wished them the best of luck as they move on to the next steps of their lives.

Valedictorian August Tabacheck told his classmates to look back on the journey to see how fast the past four years have gone. "Take the time to appreciate high school," he encouraged. Going one step further to "make a legacy you can be proud of."

Salutatorian Alexis Hrivnak told the group to be "grateful for things in your life when they might be taken away." She emphasized for students to be present in the moment and live their lives to the fullest. "Live every day like it's your last," she told them. "You only live once."

Superintendent Patrick Graczyk addressed the class, congratulating them on completing the difficult year and encouraging them to be grateful. He detailed successes that were attained throughout their years in the District.

The class earned more than \$1,057,650 in scholarships, served hundreds of hours in the community, and worked to donate thousands of dollars to charities.

Isabella Walsh, Senior Class President, commented that graduation "makes us want to slow things down a little bit." She thanked all the teachers and staff who helped the class and encouraged the students to "enjoy the final moments" and to "leave a legacy."

For the pride that they have brought to the District, congratulations and best wishes are extended to all members of the Class of 2022.

Finally, the Board of Directors approved a balanced budget that includes a newly signed five-year agreement with the teachers' union and increased technological equipment and teaching positions.



District Highlights The Successes of 2021-2022

This year, the theme of Rethink-Reset-Reignite highlights the District's commitment to move forward, even with the challenges currently in society. This year, emphasis was placed on taking the education provided, setting a new standard, and reigniting enthusiasm to build a better Allegheny Valley School District. While the District continued through the difficult course directed by the pandemic, technology, initiatives, and creative teaching ideas came to the forefront. With the regular school year interrupted for various issues, staff members created ways to continue education that enabled students and staff to learn together. As Allegheny Valley moves forward, we take heart and encouragement from the innovation, empathy, and support shown by all. The District now takes time to celebrate the following achievements:

• District staff executed a Health & Safety Plan that governed the preK-12 academic learning environment that included virtual education and in-person learning throughout the 2021-22 school year.

• Allegheny Valley was awarded over \$2.1 million in various grants throughout the school year. Grants covered costs stemming from the pandemic and supported learning loss, safety, and technology.

Developed to recognize, celebrate, and honor those alumni who have distinguished themselves through public service, academic achievement, and professional contributions, the Alumni Hall of Fame honors alumni who serve to enhance the prestige and excellence of the school district.

Melinda Kutchenreiter Suzensky (atttended 1982-1987) graduated from Springdale High School in 1987. She went on to secure a degree in Elementary Education and a Masters of Curriculum and Instruction. She currently is an active Diversity Inclusion Chair with AMS local. Suzensky has also been part of Championship Mindset a group that goes into schools to talk with students about staying on the right path, making good choices, and doing the right thing. In January 2020, Suzensky became a published author with her book "I Fit In With The Skin I'm In." The book tells the story of a biracial young girl struggling to find a way to fit in. For her efforts, Suzensky has been honored by a number of publications. She volunteers for the Multiple Sclerosis Society, the Carnegie and Avalon Libraries, the Charlie Batch Foundation, her local church, and is an active PTO member and Liaison for the Pittsburgh Public Schools. New In Education... Acmetonia Holds Summer Program

For the second year, Acmetonia Elementary School sponsored a Summer Camp in June. Eighty-four students, from those who will be entering Kindergarten in the fall to those finishing grade 5, traveled to the building for a week of fun learning. Free lunches were offered to all students, with cafeteria staff helping throughout.

The program was STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) based and included reading and writing infused in the activities. In addition, mindfulness activities with the guidance counselor and social worker were also held. "Mindfulness refers to the process of focusing your attention in the present. The idea of a mindful mindset is to help ground yourself in your surroundings while dealing with stressful or overwhelming experiences." (waterford.org)

The camp focused on lessons of force and energy, camping, rockets, weather, great outdoors, lots of focus areas. Projects ranged from making insects to launching rockets to building a golf course. Through several of the projects, older students worked with the younger children for socialization. The program was very successful according to principal Jennifer Vecchio. A survey will be going out to parents to collect feedback for future planning.

AVSD: Mindful and More

Social emotional cognitive learning skills are critical to school, career development, and life success. At Allegheny Valley, administrators are working to enrich the school environment to one where students and staff can thrive.

Five staff members recently participated in a program through the Western PA Learning Alliance to help identify positive areas in the School District and throughout the region and build on progress already made in the school sytem. The program brought together administrators from across the area to help identify successes and help shape a more positive athmosphere for students in all districts.

Supported by AASA (The School Superintendents' Association) and the Grabel Foundation, the idea begins planning in student-centered education. It looks beyond today's education system to what learning may look like in 2025, tailoring it to the individual needs of students. With changes in education happening rather quickly, planning must also find ways to transform and adjust at the same rate. As many discovered through the pandemic, today's learning takes place in many ways through various forms. Many factors must be taken into consideration.

For student success, Allegheny Valley continues building lessons and experiences for students to learn and practice soft skills like growth mindset, self-efficacy, social awareness, and self-management. Through some current programs, such as PATHS© and the Power of Hello, the District looks to build upon the school climate, which directly impacts students' academic success and abilities. Ultimately, the project will work to bring about a more positive, equitable, and supportive environment for all students.



"I knew since the girls were freshmen that we had a special group," commented coach Anthony Pototo. "Each year we improved and felt that this was the year we had the opportunity to do great things."

How correct that thinking was. Springdale High School's Softball Team has had an impressive run over the past four years. This year, they finished 13 and 3 overall, and 10 and 0 in the section. They won the section for the first time since 1998.

"The season was difficult with all the weather cancellations and the practices in the gym," continued Pototo. "We only played three home games and Senior Night was at Valley against Saint Joes." The girls, however, were resilient and stayed focused.



Acmetonia student Owen Gamble was selected as a Finalist in the Games for Change Student Challenge. Gamble's game was created in SCRATCH, free software from MIT, and entered into the "Shaping the World for Difference" category. The virtual awards program on June 16th named him as the Junior Division Regional Champion (Northeast) for his game "Undestined," which teaches us all about the challenges individuals face when their dominant hand is impacted by a physical obstacle. Grade 4 students continued their EcoChallenge program that has raised over \$19,000 for marine wildlife over the past three years.







Kindergarten Graduation Held

The end of the school year brings graduation not only for Springdale High seniors but also for the District's younger students. Continuing an annual tradition, Kindergarten students held their own graduation ceremony.

Family and friends packed the Syria Mosque to help celebrate the conclusion of this group's first full-day year of school. Students marched onto the stage to receive their diplomas and end their days in Kindergarten. Elementary Supervisor Gregory Heavner and the Kindergarten teachers helped students on their way. The Class of 2034 has 79 very proud members.

EcoStudent Challenge

Acmetonia Elementary's fourth-grade students raised \$7,009.91 in their EcoStudent Challenge. The Challenge encourages students to learn 100 fats about the environment, and secure sponsors to pay amounts for each fact the students get correct on a test. Eighteen of the 63 students had perfect scores; no student scored below 90 points.

The proceeds go to Cape Clasp, a purpose-driven brand with a mission to #makewaves for marine life causes. Through their efforts, Acme students support sea wildlife such as sharks, sea turtles, and whales. Over the three years the students have been participatein in the project, they have raised a total of \$19,132.14.

After-School Programs

During March 2022, eight Acmetonia students volunteered to try out the STEM (science, technology, education, mathematics) Design process. The students signed up in teams, and the group had to have a project idea in order to get an invite to the after-school meeting time.

By completing the idea form, these students exhibited self-motivation, which is key to any extracurricular project. The students demonstrated their first attempt at a design brief in which a solution to a problem is identified. Students must then identify criteria to be met and constraints.

After-school programs are voluntary for District students.



Staff Members Retire

At the end of the 2021-22 school year, four Allegheny Valley staff members announced their retirements. These individuals dedicated much of their lives to the field of education; the District loses numerous years of experience when these staff members walk out the doors for the last time. Leonard Herrington who joined Allegheny Valley as a social studies teacher in 1991. Over the years, he has served as an Assistant Football Coach, Secondary Student Council Sponsor, Assistant Track Coach, Junior High Boys' Baskebball Coach, Foreign Travel Sponsor, Saturday In-School Suspension Sponsor, SADD Sponsor, and Assistant Secondary Academic Games Sponsor. In addition, he was a Department Chair and Teacher Mentor. Herrington retires with 31 years at Allegheny Valley.

Kenneth Miller was hired by Allegheny Valley in 1991 as a Secondary Science Teacher. He also served as the Boys' Junior High Basketball Coach, Girls' Junior High Basketball Coach, Boys' Varsity Basketball Coach, 9th Grade Boys' Basketball Coach, National Honor Society Co-Sponsor, Assistant Track Coach, and Assistant Baskeball Coach. Miller was also a Mentor Teacher. He retires with 31 years with the District.

Janice Nuzzo joined the Allegheny Valley staff in 2002 as the High School Principal after working in several other local school districts. Over the years, she also served as the Colax Upper Elementary School Principal and the Director of Student Achievement. She coordinated the Professional Development and Curriculum areas, while also directing the PIMS, Federal Programs, and Inducation areas. Nuzzo retires with 20 years with the District.

Cesareo Sanchez was hired in 2010 as the Boys' Varsity Soccer Coach. Then, in 2012, was employed as the Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds, bringing with him years of experience in facilities management. Throughout his time with the District, he directed two District renovation projects and coordinated upgrades to digital services within his area of responsibility. He retires with 10 years with the District.

A very big thank you is sent to each of these individuals on behalf of Allegheny Valley staff, students, and community members. They have touched numerous lives, contributed to various District programs, and made Allegheny Valley a better place. While their departures will leave a void, they are wished the best of luck in whatever path they choose to follow. They deserve a happy and healthy retirement, and will truly be missed.

Financial Update: The 2022-2023 Budget

The Allegheny Valley School District's Final General Fund Operating Budget for the 2022-2023 school year was approved by the School Directors in the amount of \$23,808,722. The millage rate is unchanged at 20.8377 mills, one half of 1% earned income tax, one-half of 1% real estate transfer tax and one-half of \$10 occupation privilege tax. Local revenues are projected to increase, reflecting economic projections with higher than anticipated wages and earned income. However, interest rate hikes by the Federal Reserve can impact local revenue collections.

State Revenue is level, funded and projected at 2021-22 allocations. The Governor has proposed a historic increase for public education funding, but it competes with other agencies including publicly funded charter schools. Key incumbent losses in the May primaries now bring new priorities to the state budget negotiating table. So, while an increase in Basic and Special Education is anticipated, the state passes its budget after most school districts in the Commonwealth adopt their budgets.

There is a significant increase of federal funding through the American Rescue Plan (ARP) with Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. Federal Revenues are projected at 2021-22 levels for Title I and II, with an overall federal funding estimate of \$785,000 including the ARP funds. A key stipulation of the funding is to address student learning loss with after-school programs, summer programs etc.

The 4% increase in operating expenditures compared to the 2021-22 Budget, relates to additional personnel and programs related to federal funding; contractual obligations; significant healthcare increases; and mandated costs.

• Fourteen students participated in the Future Business Leaders of America's State Leadership Conference in

April.

• Five Springdale Jr-Sr High School students completed their investigations and created presentations for remote scoring for the Pennsylvania Jr. Academy of Science competition. All earned a "Second" in the event. Students' work is judged against a rubric and is rated as first, second, third, or honorable mention.

• Three of Allegheny Valley's Academic Games elementary students placed in the national competition: one placed in the Top Ten in Theme; one placed in the Top Ten in Propaganda; and a third student won a Three-Time Qualifier Award and placed in the Top Ten in Presidents, Current Events, and Propaganda. In addition, one student was 6th in the nation in Current Events; and one placed 6th in the nation for the Research Theme game. The research theme for 2022 was "The Gilded Age." The students' excellent performance helped their Western PA Academic Games League (WPAGL) teams take 3rd Place in the nation. • Two SHS students won 1st Place finishes in 2D Art in the 2022 Waldman International Arts & Writing competition. For the competition, students are given a prompt and are required to research the topic to highlight the lesser known stories of the Holocaust through art. One student won 1st Place as the middle school winner, and the second won 1st Place as the high school winner.

• Eight 4th and 5th grade boys participated in a STEM Design after-school program.

• Five students were selected for the Celebrating Art Competition. These students were chosen to have their artwork published in the Celebrating Art Book.


• Two 7th grade students won 3rd Place in the Allegheny Intermediate Unit's PA Media and Design Competition in the Digital Movie Category. The students made a video that highlighted the service and sacrifice of two Springdale veterans.

Virtual Learning Plans



District students participated in virtual learning throughout the Covid pandemic.

The Covid pandemic brought about many changes in school districts. One very obvious modification was virtual education. At Allegheny Valley, the program is called the Dynamo Virtual Academy (DVA). For the 2021-22 school year, 70 students were provided education through the DVA.

Some students were part-time (taking one course), while others took classes on a full time basis. Parent and student feedback listed the program flexibility, with good pacing for individual students, and interesting courses as good qualities. The drawbacks however listed challenges with the program's connection to the School District, slow response time from teachers, and difficult to navigate.

With the goal of improving virtual education in the District, Dr. Melissa Holler will coordinate a program to better support student learning. Currently in discussion for the 2022-2023 school year are working conversations with teachers on the Distance Learning facilitator role. Allegheny Valley sets expectations that District teachers will serve as Distance Learning Facilitators to check on attendance, monitor progress, answer any immediate questions, and connect students to the Waterfront/DVA teacher of record. Training for staff will occur from the Allegheny Intermediate Unit and with Dr. Holler.

In January 2023, the District will launch a pilot program for Special Education and Encore courses. Canned curriculum through Waterfront Learning will be used. However, Allegheny Valley teachers will grade assignments and interact with students. *(continued on page 14)*

• Five students from SHS participated in the Northern Area Gifted Consortium's Middle School Writing Workshop. For more than a decade, Pine Richland HS students have planned a workshop highlighting different types of writing. The 2022 theme was "The Future." Students from 14 area school districts wrote and shared their writing with students from the other schools.

• Twenty-four students in grades 3-6 participated in the Allegheny Intermediate Unit's Children's Choice Reading Festival remotely in the Acme Forum. Keynote Author Victoria Jamieson (winner of the 2021 Children's Choice Awards for When Stars are Scattered), Illustrator Joe Wos, musical comedy duo Josh and Gab, and a Battle of the Books competition were part of the program. • One senior student won a "Special Merit" acknowledgement in the Phipps Conservatory's Fairchild Challenge #4 Competition. Students created a poster featuring a green career that highlighted a geographical region that benefits from this career. Springdale's winner developed a poster featuring "Environmental Lawyer" and how this career is helping the Marshall Islands.

• One Acmetonia 6th grade student was named a "Finalist" in the Games for Change Student Challenge. The virtual awards program on June 16th, named him as the Junior Division Regional Champion (Northeast) for his game "Undestined," which teaches us all about the challenges individuals face when their dominant hand is impacted by a physical obstacle.

• Three Springdale Jr-Sr High School students competed in the Westinghouse Science Honors Institute during the 2021-22 school year. The students earned certificates for this well-known and prestigious program. On select Saturdays from October through March, qualified high school juniors from Western Pennsylvania and the surrounding communities participated in STEM inspired lectures.

• One 6th grade student received an "Honorable Mention" in the "Nature's Way" category for the Northern Area Gifted Consortium's (NAGC) Middle School Photography contest.

• The District honored three high school students as 2022 Future Famers. The Future Famers program recognizes current students, at any grade level, who consistently demonstrate an outstanding commitment to improve the District through school and community involvement, entrepreneurship, and/or scholastic achievement.

• One Springdale Jr-Sr High School student was selected for PMEA District 1 Chorus and Regional Chorus.

• One Springdale Jr-Sr High School student participated in the Alle-Kiski Valley Honors Band and the PMEA District Band.

• The 73 members of the Class of 2022 earned more than \$1 million in scholarships.

• Seventy-nine students in the Class of 2034 participated in this year's Kindergarten graduation event.

• Ninety-three students were acknowledged at the 39th Annual Honors Banquet for achieving 94% or above for the first three nine weeks of the school year. Twenty-nine seniors were honored, including four who were recognized for Honors Achievement throughout their time at Springdale Jr-Sr High School.

• SHS Boys' Soccer, Girls' Soccer, Football, Boys' Basketball, Girls' Basketball, Softball teams were invited to participate in the W.P.I.A.L. playoffs.

• District students participated in a number of service projects despite the unusual school year, including volunteering at the Lower Valley Food Bank and a "Souper Bowl" with Riverview High School. The SHS National Honor Society and the Acmetonia Elementary Student Council once again took part in the Lymphoma & Leukemia Society's Pasta For Pennies program; Acmetonia fourth grade participated in the Ecostudent Challenge raising \$7,009.91 for the environment, the high school art and consumer science programs joined together to host the *Empty Bowls* program to benefit the local food bank, and staff members supported Secret Santa and holiday giving programs. The Allegheny Valley Education Association also continued their annual Dress Down Fridays, which donates funds to the Lower Valley Food Bank.

The District congratulates all of its students and staff members on this year's accomplishments. They continue to work hard to bring recognition and esteem to Allegheny Valley. Parents, community members, and alumni should be extremely proud of a job well done.

In other words, the Waterfront/DVA will provide the online platform and curriculum, while the District will interact with the students.

The program also provides Concurrent Learning for students. Similar to what occurred throughout the 2021-22 school year, this type of program is offered for students to work remotely with their Allegheny Valley teacher while at home due to COVID or other extenuating circumstances. The District is also working with the AVEA to expand concurrent options.

"It is our hope," commented Dr. Holler, "that the Dynamo Virtual Academy can continue to bring an excellent educational opportunity to qualifying students through the integrity of the program and the quality of the academic experience."
