

Together We Can

Each year in November and December, classrooms across the District find ways to study aspects of the holiday season. Whether it's learning about the Pilgrims and Indians, practicing and performing holiday music, or discovering the history of traditions around the world, District curriculum is filled with customs, current events, and cultural practices. That aspect of the school year didn't change despite not being in the schools full time.

Students at Acmetonia Elementary enjoyed projects with the Elf on A Shelf. Other grade levels used snow and winter as topics. Pre-Kindergarten students made Santa and Rudolph drawings, and first grade students in Ms. Clark's room made life size elves. Kindergarten continued their traditional reading of 'Twas the Night Before Christmas, while Mrs. Taliana's first grade worked on a December in My Home project. In this lesson, students were asked to decorate the drawing of a house like their home. In addition, students shared what their family does during this time of the year in December, since families have different traditions and celebrate different religions.

Acmetonia Elementary students participated in a number of holiday activities. Activity groups found ways to support the community by volunteering at the Lower Valley Food Bank, collecting items for homeless shelters, and holding a food drive. The District also continued its tradition of giving trees in the elementary and secondary buildings, which staff looks forward to each year, and helping the Shop With A Cop Program.

The holiday months have always been a time for students to celebrate, observe, and learn the importance of giving, family, and community. No matter where staff and students are located or how courses are being taught, those lessons don't change. Staff and students continue to put in time and effort to learn and show appreciation to their community for all that they have been given. NHS Tutoring Continues

Student tutoring has been an important program with Springdale Jr-Sr High School's National Honor Society (NHS). Even through Remote Learning, Allegheny Valley students continue to support each other. Students meet virtually over Google Classroom, usually after school 2:30-3pm to work on math problems, review for a test, play *Kahoot* for practice or share their presentations with their high school tutor.



Students who want help usually request a high school tutor and are paired with a National Honor Society Student who is able to help them in their specific subject areas. Students are able to follow-up with the tutor on homework, have the tutor review their classwork or class projects.

NHS tutoring has been offering tutoring services for many years. The NHS tutor would work with his/her student after school with a designated teacher in various classrooms. Arrangements were made for the teams to meet after school each week, but the pandemic put the glitch in the program. NHS worked to find a solution and decided to offer the tutoring virtually. Students enjoy working with other students; they like asking questions to and talking with someone in their peer group. Students themselves can ask for a tutor, a parent or teacher can also ask about setting up tutoring for a student.

"I think the tutoring program is a great opportunity for students to work together, whether it be working in-person or virtually," commented NHS sponsor Andrea Sadowski. "It teaches all involved responsibility to keep up with their work and keep their tutoring appointments. Setting a schedule to meet weekly also enforces time management." Not surprisingly, the tutors who diligently work each week helping others after school are also the students balancing other commitments such as sports, clubs, activities, jobs and home responsibilities.

Each year, staff members apply for competitive grants that fund innovative educational projects, enrichment programs, and other educational initiatives. two grants to Allegheny Valley staff members: Ms. Kelly McGee and Ms. Rayna Wasilak.

In the seven years the Foundation has been awarding grants, the group has given over \$13,000 to the District. The Foundation's Board of Directors plan to continue their fundraising efforts. To date, a series of events and activities are coordinated to help raise money for the Grant Program. The Foundation has also instituted a Grant Partner Program, where businesses and individuals can support these grants. Kindergarten students eagerly await attending school in their pajamas and hearing the Superintendent share the story with them. This year, that tradition also continued, as Dr. Graczyk joined the classes online to read the story and spread some holiday cheer.
